Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school

principal.

- 1. Every student is advised to regularly check their DET email address as I often send important information and forms to that address. I also pass on part time/casual job opportunities when employers contact me seeking employees. 2. Year 12 students: UAC (University Admission Centre) Guides, EAS (Educational Access Schemes) applications, information about early entrance to some unis and scholarships have all arrived at school – see me if you are interested.

Most of UAC's participating institutions have Educational Access Schemes (EAS) to help students who have experienced long-term educational disadvantage gain admission to tertiary study.

To be eligible for EAS consideration your educational performance must have been seriously affected, normally for a period of at least six months during Year 11 and/or 12 or equivalent, due to circumstances beyond your control and choosing.

For more details go to: http://www.uac.edu.au/eas/ You can read about the seven broad categories of long-term educational disadvantage in the EAS FAQ or by reading the 'Types of Disadvantage' table in the 2016-17 EAS booklet.

Schools Recommendation Schemes (SRS) are one way institutions make early offers to current Australian Year 12 students who have applied for undergraduate admission through UAC. SRS are used by institutions to make offers of undergraduate admission using criteria other than (or in addition to) ATARs. These criteria may include school recommendations, senior secondary studies and personal awards and achievements. Each institution has its own policies on how its individual SRS scheme will work.

Students who are not getting an ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admission Rank) can still apply for university via the **Schools Recommendation Scheme**. For more details go to http://www.uac.edu.au/srs/

Many other universities will be holding their open days in the next few weeks. For Year 12 students contemplating university, these open days are invaluable. Check details in jobjump and mhscareers newsletters which are emailed to students in Years 10-12 every week.

Pokemon Go!

What does Surveying have to do with Pokémon?


Whilst you may be in search of virtual Pokémon, what you may not have realised is Surveying underpins the technology that makes the game possible.

Pokémon Go allows players to find and catch Pokémon located all around them using a Geographic Information System, or GIS. A GIS is a database of information that pinpoints different features to a location such as property boundaries and building locations.

Cadastral or Land Surveyors are responsible for defining land boundaries and road alignments that make up the government "Cadastre", which is the basis for the world of Pokémon Go and GIS.

So next time you play Pokémon Go, think of the mapping and analysis Surveyors have done to generate the Pokémon world, and if you are interested in maps and technology, a career in Surveying might be perfect for you.

CAMERON DOHERTY'S NEW YORK ADVENTURE

From the 10th - 30th of July I attended The Juilliard Summer Intensive Program in New York City. To attend this program I had to put a YouTube audition together around Christmas time last year. I sort advice for my audition piece from Talia Fowler who was the winner of "So You Think You Can Dance" 2009 Season, who had also been part of the Juilliard experience. I also had to submit a written report from my RAD teacher with her recommendations for me to attend.

To my elation, I was notified in April this year that my audition was successful!!! To top off all my good luck, my dance school was already considering going to New York to do some Broadway Dance Centre classes, so I was able to squeeze those in before attending Juilliard.

The schedule at Julliard was very rigid, we started each day at 9am, individual warm up was expected before every class and class ALWAYS started sharply on time if not earlier! We had half an hour for lunch somewhere between 12.15pm and 1.25pm depending on when your class finished and the next one started. Then worked through to at least 6pm each evening. This included a rehearsal we put together for the end of the intensive program that teachers from colleges and USA head dance eisteddfods attended along with our parents/friends.



We stayed in the schools dormitory accommodation just next to schools main building, which was next to Lincoln Centre, which is where many national and international ballets and concerts are held.

At nights and on Sundays we were allowed to go into city with our Dorm Managers who were 3rd and 4th year students at the college.

On the first day we were split into groups A & B. I felt the only difference was group A were all "ballet" types where group B were more "contemporary off a ballet base" - I was in group B.

We were given a timetable with around 4 different types of classes each day. These classes were ballet, men's/pointe for ladies, body play workshop, partnering, modern, music, Brenner Workshop – improvisation, rehearsal, yoga and Choreography workshops.

Ballet:

Working in this class consisted of classical technique and repertoire. Barre work consisted of 2/3 of the class. Lots of time was spent on working on the fundamentals of ballet. Centre practice made up the balance of the class.

Every single thing you do in ballet comes from a plié, tendu, or a randde-jambe. That drew me to conclude that by having the fundamentals of technique 100%, would then help me to achieve the rest of movements at a higher level.


Men's Class:

Very similar to ballet but we instead worked on specific steps that have been created for men. The lesson plan focused on building certain technique, with a close focus on men's grande allegros and pirouettes.

Body Play Workshop:

This class was about finding new ways your body can move. I learnt that you're not doing what you think you're doing; you're doing what you're thinking. Also less is more!

Overall it was the hardest I've ever worked but it was amazing! Loved every second!





Performing Lord of the Flies was the best experience we've ever had. We made so many great friends along the way. Also none of this could've



allowing them to explore the elements of drama, performance and exercise their skills in composition and theatricality. The female




