PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Term Two has been a busy term with students and staff engaged in a variety of different activities. Many students, parents and teachers have worked tirelessly in the school Curriculum Review, led by HT Administration, Ms Maria Scott. The Curriculum review has focused on four key areas including the structure of the school day. Following recommendations from the review, the school will be trialling different bell times for implementation in Term 3 as outlined below. While the school day start and finish times remain the same, 8.20am and 2.32pm respectively, the removal of the five minute break and slight period changes allow for increases to a 20 minute recess and a 40 minute lunch break for students, a recommendation supported by students, staff and parents. Thanks to the members of the school community who provided feedback to the review via the completion of surveys or by taking part in the parent focus groups.

They were runners up in the impromptu Eco Drama section and won the instagram hashtag competition.

The school Year 11 Debating Team has also been successful in reaching the Regional Semi Finals – well done Jesmond Connolly-Borg, Mitchell Farrugia, Jack Felkin and David Moore and their coach, Ms Lee.

On the sporting field our students continue to do us proud. Zone Cross Country has seen a record number of Northmead students representing our school. Congratulations to Max Spackman 12 Years Boys Age Champion. 18 Northmead students continued Sydney West Cross Country, with year 12 student Cody Watson qualifying for the CHS Cross Country.

ENGLISH - BELL SHAKESPEARE PERFORMANCE

Student in Year 8 and Year 9 have been studying Shakespeare in their English classes this term and were given the opportunity to watch Bell Shakespeare perform 'Macbeth: The Rehearsal' and 'Shakespeare is Dead.' The performances were fantastic as they encourage students and teachers to get on stage and perform beside the actors.



Review - Macbeth: The Rehearsal

Bell Shakespeare was an amazing performance in which the storyline was well rehearsed and performed. Macbeth was told in an engaging and unique way where the actors would constantly stop and explain the character's emotions and perspective along with telling a description of what happened in the scene. For me, the humorous one-liners and the interaction with the audience was performed perfectly. The performance was portrayed to the audience as a rehearsal of the play, which was beneficial as the three actors could portray their own personalities and the characters that they were playing. This allowed for awkward interactions between characters which added depth to the story of Macbeth. In the beginning the male actor was confused about how to play the role of Macbeth, however, by the end of the play he became in love with the character Macbeth and used his own emotions to improve the portrayal of the story. The female actor who played Lady Macbeth used her impressive acting skills to express the dominating and overconfident attitude of her character. I believe the tragedy of Shakespearian Macbeth combined with a modern-day humour is the best way to explain Shakespeare's literature to teenage students.

Fact sheet for parents and carers

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Planning has begun to move NAPLAN from a pen and paper assessment to an online assessment.

What are the benefits of NAPLAN Online?

Results will be faster and more precise

- Your child's individual results will be returned to you within just a few weeks of the NAPLAN testing.
- Online assessment will reduce the time it takes to mark and provide feedback to schools, teachers and parents.
- Improved precision and timing of results will help teachers to tailor their teaching more specifically to address students' learning needs.

Tailored tests will provide better assessment

- The online format allows for 'tailored testing', where the test adapts to a student's performance and asks questions that match their achievement level.
- Students in each year level start with the same set of questions which can then branch into a different set of questions based on their responses to the first set of questions.
- This means that students will be directed to questions that may be easier or more challenging depending on their responses.
- This test design will allow students to better demonstrate their literacy and numeracy skills.
- Students find online assessment is more engaging*, which
 means they are encouraged to persist longer and try harder.
- Research by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) into online assessment has shown that students have engaged well with electronic tests.

NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test

NSW schools will participate in a school readiness test between 14 August and 22 September 2017.

The school readiness test is a 'practice run' for schools to assess their technology ahead of NAPLAN Online. The readiness test is not an assessment of student ability. The readiness test allows schools to:

- become familiar with the NAPLAN Online test format and processes
- check whether they have the technical capacity, rooms and devices to administer NAPLAN Online
- provide students in NAPLAN years 3, 5, 7 and 9 with the opportunity to experience the online test question types and format by completing a practice NAPLAN online test.

Frequently asked questions

Which students will participate in the NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test?

Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 will participate.

How should I prepare my child for the NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test?

Your child will not need any academic preparation for the school readiness test. This is not a test of their literacy and numeracy skills, but an opportunity for them to experience the online test format and for their school to assess its online testing capability.

How long is the school readiness test?

The school readiness test is expected to include two assessments: a writing assessment* and a combined numeracy/literacy assessment. The duration of each assessment will be approximately 40 minutes.

 Year 3 students will only be expected to complete the combined numeracy/literacy assessment.

When will my school participate in the readiness test?

One week within the test period in August and September will be identified for each school to conduct readiness testing.

How will students be prevented from using the internet or spellcheckers when completing the test?

The NAPLAN Online assessment platform will have state-ofthe-art security protections. The assessment is delivered inside a locked-down browser. This ensures students cannot access the internet or spellcheckers while completing the test.

Will schools and parents be provided with information on the results of the readiness test?

There will be feedback to schools about the technical information gained from the readiness testing. There will be no reporting of student test results from the readiness test.

NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program.

In 2017 the following vaccines will be offered:

| YEARS | VACCINE | NUMBER OF DOSES |
|-------------|---|---|
| | Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine | 2-doses in 2017 at least 6 months apart* |
| Year 7 | Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine | Single dose |
| | Varicella vaccine (chickenpox) – catch-up | Single dose |
| Years 11-12 | Meningococcal ACWY vaccine | Single dose |

^{*} The second dose of HPV vaccine is being delayed to later in the year (at least 6 months after the first dose) to allow the recently-announced Meningococcal ACWY Vaccination Program to be offered to students in Years 11 and 12 from Term 2 when the second dose of HPV vaccine is usually given. There is no harm for Year 7 students in delaying the second dose of HPV vaccine and further advice for parents will be provided later in the year regarding HPV course completion.

Parent Information Kits that include an information sheet, consent form and privacy statement will be sent home to parents/guardians. To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to:

- read all the information provided
- complete the consent form, including signing their name next to the vaccine/s they would like their child to receive
- · return the completed consent form to their child's school
- · ensure that their child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Please note that students who commence HPV vaccination in school clinics in Year 7 but do not complete the course during the school year may be offered catch-up doses at school in Year 8. Students who have any HPV doses at their GP will be advised to complete the course with their GP.

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or phoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation.

To improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses throughout the year where possible.

A Record of Vaccination card will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic. Parents/guardians should ensure that this record is kept for future reference and should not assume that their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this Record of Vaccination.

Summary of the program is as follows:

- Year 7 students will be offered two doses of a three-dose course of Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine, a single dose of Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis (dTpa) vaccine and a single dose of Varicella (Chickenpox) vaccine.
- Year 11 & 12 students will be offered a single dose of Meningococcal ACWY vaccine.

Catch-up program

- Year 7 students who missed dose 2 or 3 human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine in 2016, will be offered this vaccine ONLY in Year 8 2017 to complete the course.
- Year 11 & 12 students who miss Meningococcal ACWY will be able to catch-up at a subsequent Year 7 clinic later in the year if possible.

Bicycle Policy

Students wishing to ride their bicycle to school need to read the following and return the second page of this document with their parent's signature to the Front office.

Parents and carers are responsible for how their child travels to and from school. However, under duty of care, schools are responsible for the student once they have entered the school premises.

Since July 1 1991, cyclists of all ages have been required by law to wear a helmet. By law, all riders and passengers must wear an Australian and New Zealand Standards (AS/NZ2063) approved helmet. Helmets need to be securely fitted and fastened on the rider's head. Advice on how to correctly fit a helmet can be found in the RTA publication *Information for parents and carers about safety on wheels*.

Students wishing to cycle home from sport during school time must have the Principal's written permission and must **WALK** their bike to the venue and in the company of the teacher on duty. Once dismissed from the activity they must wear an Australian and New Zealand Standards (AS/NZ2063) approved helmet. Students without these helmets may not take part in cycling, on or off school grounds.

Children under 12 years, by law, are allowed to ride bicycles on the footpath unless there are signs that specifically prohibit cycling. Children aged between 10 and 12 years old should avoid cycling on busy roads (for example Windsor Rd). The Department of Education and Communities supports the RTA in this recommendation.

Cyclists over 12 years must not ride on the footpath unless it is signposted as a shared footpath. Cyclists, just as other road users, must comply with all road rules.

By law, bicycles must be fitted with a working brake and bell. This is a parent and carer responsibility.

Schools are obliged to notify parents and carers when a student is seen to be not wearing or incorrectly wearing a bicycle helmet when riding to or from school.

Once a student arrives at the school gates/boundary they must dismount from their bicycle and **WALK** the bicycle to the caged area adjacent to the Front office. They must provide their own lock to secure their property.

Although the school can provide an area for storage it cannot accept responsibility for theft or damage.

At the end of the school day, students put on their helmet and WALK their bicycle to the front gate or school boundary at which point they can then mount the bicycle for their journey home.
